Instructions for Virtual Adaptation:

- 1. Tell students that in order for them to work well as a class, it helps to understand how classmates are similar and different and to respect those differences.
- 2. Introduce the following activity, called "Stand Up/Sit Down." Explain that you'll be adapting a little bit since you're not all in the same room. Then, explain how it will work:
 - You will make a series of statements (examples on the left).
 - If the statement is true for them, ask them to raise their hand (with video on). If no video, write "me" in the chat.
 - After each statement ask students to look around to notice who has their hand up and who doesn't, in order to see what they can learn about each other.
 - Have everyone sit down after they have a few seconds to look around, and then share the next statement.

3. After all statements are read, ask students: What did you learn about the students in our class? Point out that some students have things in common and students can be also be different, and that is OK!
